What teaches kids about the importance of recycling and keeping the earth clean than a community clean up. On Saturday, March 25, 10 adults and 6 children (all boat based residents of the City Marina) volunteered to clean flotsam and debris from the mangroves adjoining the City Marina and the Community Park's tennis court parking lots. Not only did they remove over 30 bags of trash (approximately 500 lbs) but one young man found a Florida license plate with a registration date of 1985!

Six very enthusiastic children were first given guidelines such as not stepping onto young mangrove shoots, and learning how these unique plants serve as a natural sieve to prevent both debris and runoff from polluting our waters.

It was a great volunteer effort by the boating community in Boot Key Harbor.

The children may be in the running for an award by the harbor's monthly N.O.S E. Pickers award. The acronym stands for Nautical Obstruction Salvage Experts, and is usually done from and in Boot Key Harbor waters. Though this cleanup was land based, since the mangroves are intrinsic to healthy harbor waters, the children might have a good chance at first prize!

These young children were very happy to have helped play a part in cleaning up our coastal waters. We felt they deserve some recognition! If you know these young children or the adults thank them for helping keeping our waters and our community clean! Way to go!!


